November 29, 2020 – January 3, 2021

Advent is about getting ready for a new beginning. During Advent, we remember that there were many centuries of longing for a showing from God before one ever took place in Bethlehem 2000+ years ago. In Advent, in the midst of our current time, we realize that we too long for God to visit us here, in our pandemic tinged circumstances. Finally, during Advent, we look toward a holy showing that is yet to come, for us but for all those who are as yet unborn. Perhaps this very Christmas 2020, when we once again make the familiar proclamation that Christ is born, a second birth will happen for us all? In fact, all of creation anticipates it, longs for it, groans for it with sighs to deep for words (Romans 8:22, 26).

This year the material, secular preparations for Christmas are simply not going to be possible on the scale we have been used to. This is not a bad thing! The door opens for us to more intentionally focus on the spiritual rhythms of



Advent and Christmas. Over the four weeks of Advent we traditionally light candles on an Advent wreath in order to mark the time and call forth the Advent gifts of hope, peace, joy and love. As we

approach the end of Advent on Christmas Eve, we open our hearts to the final gift of the season, the birth of the Light of Life, God's Christ Child, once again in the world. Within the story of his birth we find the promise of our own re-birth. We find ourselves proclaiming:

"Christ is born!",

"Il est né!

"Das Kindlein ist geboren!",

" Âsay manito-âwasis!"

ADVENT-TO-GO HOME PACKS

To help us all focus on the spiritual rhythms of Advent, we at Salisbury United Church have put together an **Advent-To-Go pack** for you to use at home. In those packs you will find the material to make your own **mini Advent wreath**. You can use that wreath on Sunday evenings starting November 29 along with the reflections in this book.

Along with reflections for Sunday evenings in Advent, this booklet offers suggestions for simple things you can do for **follow-up during the week**. You are also invited to join us on **Sunday mornings** online during Advent at **10:30 am**, when we will be lighting our church's Advent wreath.

If you do not have one of our To-Go packs, **you can always use a single candle** you have on hand and simply relight it each Sunday while you read the evening reflection. **Blue** or purple are the traditional colours of Advent candles. **White** is the colour for the candle we light on **Christmas Eve** and beyond.

(the first blue candle is lit)

EXCERPT: “The Uruguayan” by Eduardo Galeano, 1988

“The Uruguayan political prisoners may not talk without permission, or whistle, smile, sing, walk fast, or greet other prisoners; nor may they make or receive drawings of pregnant women, couples, butterflies, stars or birds.

One Sunday, Didasko Perez, a schoolteacher tortured and jailed for “having ideological ideas”, is visited by his daughter, Milay, aged five. She brings him a drawing of birds. The guards destroy it at the entrance of the jail.

On the following Sunday, Milay brings him a drawing of trees. Trees are not forbidden, and the drawings get through. Didasko praises her work and asks about the coloured circles scattered in the treetops, ... “Are they oranges? What fruit is it?” And she whispers in his ear, “Silly. Don’t you see they’re eyes? They’re the eyes of the birds I’ve smuggled in for you.”

TO PONDER & PRAY: Where, when or how has hope been hiding in plain sight for you?

(When you are ready, extinguish your candle and offer prayer)

EXCERPTS: *The Diary of a Young Girl*, by Anne Frank³

“The reason I’m starting a diary is that I have no real friend. ...I feel like writing. The young are not afraid of telling the truth....

Why is mankind so insane? Why make enormous planes, bombs, ...? Why spend millions on the war each day, and nothing for artists, for the poor? Why do people starve, with mountains of food spoiling in other parts of the world?...

Who has inflicted this upon us? Who has made us different from all other people? Who has allowed us to suffer so terribly up till now?...

I feel the sufferings of millions and yet, if I look up into the heavens, I believe - not everyone has the gift of believing in heavenly things - I believe in spite of everything that mankind is really, at its heart, *good*....

EXCERPT: The Book of Joy⁴, by Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama XIV

“What is this thing called joy, ... that it can evoke such a wide range of feelings? How can the experience of joy span from those tears of joy at a birth to an irrepressible belly laugh at a joke to a serenely contented smile during meditation? **Dalai Lama XIV**

EXCERPT: Christmas Eve 1943, Letters from Prison, Dietrich Bonhoeffer⁵

I wish I could say something to help you in the time of separation which lies immediately ahead. ... I have learnt something about it myself during the last nine months [in prison], ...I should like to pass it on to you.

In the first place nothing can fill the gap when we are away from those we love, It is nonsense to say that God fills the gap: he does not fill it but keeps it empty so that our communion with another may be kept alive, even at the cost of pain. In the second place the dearer and richer our memories, the more difficult the separation. But gratitude converts the pangs of memory into a tranquil joy. ... Treated in this way, the past can give us lasting joy and inspiration. Thirdly, times of separation are not a total loss, nor are they completely unprofitable ..., they can be a wonderful means of strengthening and deepening fellowship. Fourthly, it has been borne in upon me here with peculiar force that ... fear and anxiety magnify [themselves] to an immeasurable degree ... we must commend our loved ones wholly and unreservedly to God ..., transforming our anxiety for them into prayers on their behalf.

TO PONDER PRAYERFULLY: Which worries and fears might you transform into prayers or actions for others?

(when you are ready, extinguish your candle)

Holy One, may your love be born again in my head and heart.

May your love be in all I say and do. May your love encircle the earth. Amen.

EXCERPTS: Christmas Sermons, Martin Luther (1483-1546), compiled by Shawn Thomas⁶

“Now a decree went out from Augustus Caesar that all the world should be taxed.” And now Joseph had to go back to be enrolled. ... And as they approached ... Bethlehem, Joseph was saying, “... Soon we’ll be among relatives and we can borrow everything.” A fine idea that was! There was all the room in the inn, but nobody would give up a room! ... Mary and Joseph were obliged to take refuge in a stable,

“And she brought forth her firstborn child and laid him in a manger.” Think of it, women! She didn’t even have a cradle to lay the baby in. No warm water, no cold water, no pan, no towels, no table It’s a wonder the little fellow didn’t freeze to death!

“Now there were shepherds abiding in the fields by night, watching over their sheep.” ... “And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host.” ... I wouldn’t have believed it. But God is amazing. He sends a little baby, as weak as an earthworm, lying in the feedbox of a donkey,

The shepherds went to Bethlehem, and ... told the whole countryside round about what had come to pass. And then we read, “And the shepherds returned.” That certainly must be a mistake. It ought to be! “And the shepherds shaved their heads, and counted their prayers, and went into a monastery!” But no, it says they returned ... to their sheep. And a very good thing for their sheep indeed!

(when you are ready, blow out your candle)

Holy One, may the gift of Jesus the Christ be re-born in me, along with
your hope, your peace, your joy, your love. Amen.

EXCERPT: “Just Drop the Blanket” by Jason Soroski

I was in the first grade back when they still performed Christmas pageants in schools (less than 50 years, but still a very long time ago), and our class performed a version of the Charlie Brown Christmas. Since I was kind of a bookworm and already had a blue blanket, I was chosen to play the part of Linus. As Linus, I memorized [Luke 2:8-14](#), and that Scripture has been hidden in my heart ever since.

But while working so diligently to learn those lines, there is one important thing I didn't notice then, and didn't notice until now. Right in the middle of speaking, Linus drops the blanket. Throughout the story of Peanuts, Lucy, Snoopy, Sally and others all work to no avail to separate Linus from his blanket. And even though his security blanket remains a major source of ridicule for the otherwise mature and thoughtful Linus, he simply refuses to give it up.

In that climactic scene when Linus shares "what Christmas is all about," he drops his security blanket, ... when he utters the words, "fear not"

TO PONDER PRAYERFULLY: What role has fear played in your life this past year? What fears might you drop?

(when you are ready, extinguish your candle)

EXCERPT: "My Sister's Keeper" by Jodi Picoult

"I suddenly remember being about seven, riding beside him in the car, and asking him how grown-ups found their way to places. After all, I had never seen him pull out a map. "I guess we just get used to taking the same turns," he said, but I wasn't satisfied.

"Then what about the first time you go somewhere?" "Well," he said, "we get directions." But what I want to know is who got them the very first time? What if no one's ever been where you're going? "Dad?" I ask, "is it true that you can use stars like a map?"

"Yeah, if you understand celestial navigation." "Is it hard?" I'm thinking maybe I should learn. A backup plan, for all those times I feel like I'm just wandering in circles.

"It's pretty jazzy math—you have to measure the altitude of a star, figure out its position using a nautical almanac, figure out what you think the altitude should be and what direction the star should be in based on where you think you are, and compare the altitude you measured with the one you calculated. Then you plot this on a chart, as a line of position. You get several lines of position to cross, and that's where you go."

My father takes one look at my face and smiles. "Exactly," he laughs. "Never leave home without your GPS."

⁷Epiphany means "unveiling". Epiphany is the Sunday when the church completes the Advent/Christmas cycle by remembering the visit of the wisemen to Jesus at home. Epiphany is also a season of worship in January and February when we reflect on the revealing of Jesus as the Christ, the Light of the World.
